June 1–June 6 by 3 p.m. File Civilian Mail-In Ballot Application in person and vote in person at the Hunterdon County Clerk's office at 71 Main Street in Flemington. The County Clerk's office is open additional hours for voting in person on Main Street, Flemington on Thursday, June 2nd until 7 p.m. and on Saturday June 4th from 11 a.m. to 3 p.m.

Voter registration and Vote-by-Mail ballot applications are available at the Township Building or on the internet at [www.co.hunterdon.nj.us](http://www.co.hunterdon.nj.us). Click on "County Clerk" at top left corner, then review information under "Connecting the Clerk." Download Vote-by-Mail application. Mail your application to the Hunterdon County Clerk. After receiving your application, the County Clerk sends you the actual mail-in ballot. After marking your choices, you mail the ballot to the County Clerk in the envelope provided or hand-deliver it.

If you are voting for the first time in Delaware Township, you may be asked to show a photo ID. Voters whose records are not in the voting books may be asked to vote by paper Provisional Ballot. County Board of Elections will check your registration later at its office in Flemington.

## Meet Your Neighbor: Harriet Fisher

**H**arriet Van Hyning was born in East Orange in 1928. Her father, who worked for Koolerator Refrigerators, always wanted to own a farm. When Harriet was twelve, the family moved to their farm on Rt. 523 in Sergeantsville, and Harriet and her older sister Alice helped their father care for the Cheviot sheep flock which he raised.

Henry, the man who was to become her husband, lived down the road on a farm on Fisher's Hill near Reading Road. He attended the Sergeantsville Methodist Church on Sundays, and other church activities for young people. Harriet attended as well, and they gradually fell in love.

After finishing school at the Holmquist School for Girls (now Solebury School) in Solebury, Pa., Harriet worked as a medical secretary for St. Francis Hospital in Trenton until her marriage to Henry.

The couple married in 1950 at Sergeantsville Methodist Church, and moved to a small Cape Cod built by Henry and his father on Rosemont-Ringoes Road. On his father's farm, Henry helped milk 150 cows every day, twice a day. Harriet says, "Sometimes I would go out to the barn at night with Henry when a cow had milk fever. I would hold the bottle and a light for him. But I didn't have to help with milking." She did cook big meals every day, including roasts and mashed potatoes and pies, for at least five people. She and Henry were "very, very happy," sitting and talking on the back porch after supper when the weather was nice, and playing badminton on Sundays with visiting friends.

She gave birth to the couple's first child, Henry, who was premature and had a hole in his heart. He lived only two years. Three other boys would follow, one prematurely who did not survive, and Robert, who weighed four pounds at birth. In July of 1963, Harriet gave birth to Charlie, her first full-term child. Charlie had a cleft palate. After Charlie's birth, her "wonderful pediatrician" referred them to Dr. Peter Randall who worked with facial anomalies at Children's Hospital of Philadelphia (CHOP). "They were wonderful to us" Harriet says.

Over the years, Charlie had many surgeries at CHOP. One day, Harriet was at the hospital for a

ladies' luncheon. Dr. Randall met them and gave each \$2, saying he wanted them to take the \$2 and make it grow to help buy equipment for CHOP. Harriet's idea was to have tourists who might want to visit the charming village of Sergeantsville come for "teas," at which time she would explain the reasons for the teas.

The first tea was in 1973 at Ginny Hook's home. The next year, it was at the Methodist Church. It grew from there into Delaware Township's 40-year, house-tour-tradition, "Thanksgiving In the Country." All proceeds went to the Cleft Palate unit of CHOP. The tours ended in 2014. It was a monumental achievement, donating over \$500,000 to the Facial Reconstruction Unit.

"There are so many to thank" Harriet says. Millie Welch was her co-chairman and the person who recruited the homes for the tour. Jeanette Dillely organized the buses. Caterer Laura Mangone's excellent recipes were featured in the luncheons. The late Rachael Trainor was their treasurer for 29 years. Many people contributed pumpkins and cornstalks, and Bob Baker and husband Henry did the decorating. "We raised money so CHOP could buy all kinds of equipment. And everybody wanted the recipe for our pumpkin soup" she says proudly.

"Our group is one of the founder societies for this cause" Harriet says proudly. "Thanksgiving In the Country" is featured in the long hallway at CHOP. It wouldn't have happened without the help from a lot of wonderful people. "And they are dear friends to this day" Harriet says.

## Eagle Scout Project: Sutton Family Burying Grounds

*Local Boy Scout Sam Zeloof describes his restoration project:*

**H**i, my name is Sam Zeloof and I am a Boy Scout of Troop 194 in Flemington. For my Eagle Scout project I organized and implemented a restoration, reconstruction, and research project on the Sutton Family Burying Grounds.

The cemetery is located on Sutton Farm road in the woods near house number 60 and is set back about 50 feet from the road. There is a Township owned easement leading from the road to the cemetery.

The cemetery's stone wall was falling apart and the enclosed area was extremely overgrown to the point where no one could walk through it and appreciate the historical significance of the site and all those buried in it.

In addition to removing many invasive plants and cleaning up the general area, I and all those who helped me installed a sign within the stone walls to denote the existence of the cemetery and created a map outlining where all of the graves are as well as any legible information we were able to obtain from the stones.

In total, the project took over 200 hours to complete. I am happy to know that we have helped to preserve the legacy and historical significance of the site and all those buried in it.

I would like to thank everyone that assisted with the project as well as special thanks to Bob Leith, Judy Allen, and the Delaware Township Committee for making it possible.

## Barber Burying Ground

**T**he Barbers Burying Ground Association held its annual spring cleaning day at the cemetery on Lambertville-HQ Road, removing branches, twigs, and other debris from around the grounds. A large fallen trunk that had damaged parts of the stone wall was also removed.

## Pipeline Update

**T**he Federal Energy Regulatory Commission (FERC) informed all interested parties that it would likely take the majority of 2016 to complete the environmental impact statement (EIS) for the PennEast pipeline. The EIS is the next step in FERC's approval process so it is unclear whether there is any significance to this protracted timeframe. In the meantime, the Pipeline Subcommittee continues to examine all information provided by PennEast to FERC in response to Delaware Township's concerns to ensure that PennEast has properly enumerated and responded to all issues.

The Delaware River Basin Commission (DRBC) announced that it would hold separate public hearings on the PennEast application. This is an important signal that the DRBC is taking seriously the water quality concerns raised by all entities regarding placement of the pipeline. This also provides another opportunity to get those concerns on the public record.

Members of Homeowners Against Land Taking (HALT) filed suit against PennEast for trespass. Pipeline companies do not have the authority to enter public property unless or until FERC has approved the pipeline. To date this approval has not occurred, thus leading the residents to take this action.

Finally, a group of Mayors from affected townships, including Susan Lockwood from Delaware Township, traveled to Washington, D.C. to strongly reiterate our unified opposition to the location of the PennEast pipeline through our communities.

The group met with representatives from two branches of EPA (the office responsible for overseeing waters and wetlands and the office that oversees the National Environmental Policy Act process), and the President's Council on Environmental Quality, presented petitions with more than 5000 signatures to the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission (FERC), and then met with Congressman Leonard Lance, Congresswoman Bonnie Watson Coleman, and staff from Senator Booker and Senator Menendez' offices. The meetings were scheduled and facilitated by representatives from the groups Rethink Energy, NJ; Stony Brook Millstone Watershed Association, and the New Jersey Conservation Foundation.

## Township Budget for 2016

On May 9th, the Delaware Township Committee approved the 2016 Township Municipal Budget. By a 5 to 0 vote, the Committee approved the amount of \$4,328,665 for General Appropriations, which is approximately \$125,000 (or 3%) more than our 2015 Appropriations.

The Committee this year faced a few issues that led to the increase. Among those issues were: a projected increase of \$60,000 above last year for delinquent taxes; \$75,000 in mandated increases due to insurance, contracted salaries, and municipal debt obligations; and a \$50,000 increase to our budget surplus as we begin to rebuild it in accordance with recommendations from ratings agencies.

The Township's auditor, William Colantino, stated during the meeting that residents would see an increase in their property tax bills of approximately ten dollars for every \$100,000 in assessed value. The average assessed value of a property in Delaware Township is approximately \$425,000, so the average increase for municipal taxes will be \$42.50.

The Committee is beginning to work on next year's budget. We welcome input from all residents as we look to the 2017 tax year.

## Clean Water

If your car leaks oil in the driveway, you might as well let it leak into the ocean. Rain washes pollutants into storm drains which flows directly into our streams, lakes, rivers and the ocean.

What's the problem with motor oil? Oil does not dissolve in water. When motor oil runs into storm drains either from changing your car's oil or from leaky cars, it goes directly to our lakes, rivers and the ocean.

Oil and other petroleum products are toxic and can contaminate your drinking water, as well as kill fish, wildlife and plants. Did you know that one pint of oil can make a slick larger than a football field? Used motor oil is the largest single source of all oil pollution in lakes, streams and rivers. Americans spill 180 million gallons of used oil each year into our waters.

You can help! Keep your car well maintained. Regularly check your car for leaks and schedule tune-ups. If you find leaks or drips, have your car repaired. Take your car to a service center to change oil. If you do change your own oil, do it in a garage, never on the street. Use a self-contained oil pan and discard the oil at a local service center for recycling. Never discard oil, gas, or antifreeze into a storm drain.

If you spill hazardous fluids, contain it immediately with rags and cat litter. Clean up the spill and properly dispose of the waste.

Why should you care about clean water? Stormwater pollution is one of the greatest threats to New Jersey's clean water supply. Clean water provides access to safe drinking water, a place for recreation, commercial opportunities, healthy wildlife habitats, and adds beauty to our landscape. Rain washes pollution from streets, parking lots, and lawns into storm drains, then directly into streams, rivers, lakes and the ocean.

Did you know more than 60 percent of water pollution comes from things like motor oil, fertilizers, pet waste, and detergents? By sharing the responsibility and making small, easy changes in our daily lives, we can keep common pollutants out of stormwater. ## Animal Control

**T**he animal control officer for Delaware Township is Thomas Dodd (908-310-1452).

Call animal control if you have stray dogs and cats, orphaned wildlife infants, or observe any wildlife that appears to be injured, ill, or creating a threat. Animal control will not be able to remove wildlife that is creating a nuisance, such as squirrels in the attic, groundhogs, raiding raccoons, etc. but they will discuss ways to deal with the problem or refer you to outside sources of relief.

However, feral cats that are being fed will not be removed to the animal shelter. Any animal bites should be immediately reported.
