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Editorial

In sports, when a team loses its most seasoned players, they often refer to the year as a "rebuilding year" and I think that's the type of year this has been for Delaware Township. In 2016, we welcomed two new Committeemen. Mid-year, we hired a new Township Clerk, Assistant Clerk, and a policeman.

A new Committee often brings new initiatives. The Township created a Technology Subcommittee to evaluate the Township's computer systems with a goal of updating them to benefit both staff and the public.

We began a road survey, to help us better plan road projects in an organized, and hopefully more cost-effective way. We also created a Side Walk Committee to determine if we can, or even should, add sidewalks to make the Township a more walkable community.

There were also many ongoing tasks that continued through 2016. The Pipeline Subcommittee took the lead in writing hundreds of comments against the PennEast pipeline project, attended every scheduled FERC hearing, and passed resolutions to keep illegal surveyors and appraisers off residents' properties.

The Recreation Commission sponsored another successful Community Day, and, finally, after more than seven years of work among the Historical Society, the Township's Historical Advisory Committee, and the State Green Acres Program, we may see the Holcombe House preserved and auctioned off in 2017.

Regardless of what 2017 brings, we'll be ready to handle it with the help of dedicated Township staff and volunteers working together with the Township Committee.

Meet Your Neighbor: David Smith

David Smith's been my neighbor for more than 30 years. Our children grew up together. I knew that he was an organic herb farmer, and a film and TV camera operator working out of New York City. But I did not know the scope and dignity of his work; did not know he has been nominated for thirteen Primetime Emmy Awards and won twice; and did not know he and his wife were named Hunterdon County Soil Conservation District's "Outstanding Conservation Farmers." It's never too late to meet your neighbor....

David was born in New York and has two sisters. When he was five, his family moved overseas where his father started a business in Belfast, Northern Ireland. David spent the next five years going to primary school in a London suburb.

Upon returning to the US, the family moved to the North Shore of Long Island, where he went to high school, then to college in Rochester, New York, where he studied photography. He worked for his uncle, who had the television rights to the Amateur Athletic Union, and filmed amateur team sports: swimming and diving; boxing, gymnastics, track and field. He later began free-lancing.

In 1984, David and his wife Elise, both gardeners, decided to try organic farming. A colleague introduced him to the Lambertville area, and they found their current property. It was a good choice as it was an easy commute to New York City for his camera jobs, though it was occasionally rough getting home at 1:30 am after filming a hockey game, and getting up early to farm.

They became very good growers, and had one of the first three farms to be certified as "organic" by the State of New Jersey. David served on the Organic Certification Standards Committee for a couple of years. The Smiths raised two children, Allison and Mirielle, both of whom attended DTS and Hunterdon Central.

The freelance television business is very stratified and diverse. David began branching out from his sports experience by word-of-mouth. He began to do pro sports: national hockey and basketball, tennis, soccer. "It was great training" he says. "You learn to shoot instinctively, quickly; framing constantly, and you never know what's going to happen, unlike filming on a set, where everything is staged."

He began shooting sit-coms in the 1980's and 90's: "The Cosby Show," "Spin City," "Soul Man," "Whoopi," and many others. He did the Tony Awards for nine years. Then he got a chance to fill in for someone at the Metropolitan Opera. That was the first Performing Arts program he did and he loved it.

"Opera, symphonic music, rock, folk, hip hop, country music, drama, ballet, and modern dance. In some of these productions the camera operators work from a script, while the director works from a score. Every camera cut is marked and numbered with every shot described. Rehearsals are viewed in conferences lasting several days for an opera, with every facet watched and discussed to prepare for the show. It's a collaborative, team effort, one of the things I really love about it." If it's done well, you don't think about the camera work, or any of the dozen or so other crafts involved. You don't think about what effort goes into all of this. People just sit back and enjoy it.

David received two Emmy Awards for his work on two Metropolitan Opera shows that aired on PBS: "Carmen" in 1998 and "Don Pasquale" in 2011. This year, he was nominated for "The Wiz Live," and "The Tony Awards."

He feels that he is blessed because so much of television entertainment today is "worse than junk; going to the lowest common denominator. But I get to showcase amazing performers and their art all over the world...bringing joy to so many people... for example the Met's "Live in HD" series simulcasts opera live to cinema screens in 70 countries. It's wonderful."

Open Space Preservation

The New Jersey Conservation Foundation and Delaware Township now share ownership of 12 acres of open space in Rosemont, paid for by grants from the State of NJ Green Acres program and the Hunterdon County Open Space program. The tract was purchased at auction five years ago by the Rosemont Foundation, a charitable organization established by Township resident and former US Senator Robert Torricelli, to hold while funding for permanent preservation was being arranged.

The two part-time police officers are Mike O'Rourke and Ed Gibney, both retired Sergeants from other police departments.

Deanna Higgins, who wears many hats in the Township, is an integral part of the team as the administrative assistant.

We also would like to congratulate Patrolman Paul Murphy who has just recently been hired, after serving 12 years with the Frenchtown Police Department. Patrolman Murphy will be acting as the liaison to the Delaware Township School. He lives in Holland Township with his wife and six children. Welcome!

In addition to their 24-hour presence in the community, the police have a daily presence at Delaware Township school in the morning and afternoon hours when children are going to and from the school grounds. They get involved in community activities such as the Great Crate Race and keep a watchful eye during Halloween activities.

Additionally, they offer a child safety seat installation program to assist parents in making sure the safety seats are properly installed. Chief Crane is currently working on making available a prescription drop-off box.

Chief Cane sees the job of the Police Department as serving the community and interacting with the citizens of the Township in a positive manner. Thank you and congratulations to all the members of the Township Police Department.

Additionally, after retirement, he began his own consulting business and was in fact at a business meeting in Florida at the time of this interview. Happily, he was able to get in a game of golf while there.

Chuck's roots in Delaware Township go way back. He and his wife have been living on a parcel of the family farm since 1979.

Two of their three sons live in New Jersey and one lives in Eastern Pennsylvania. Chuck and his wife have five grandchildren, ranging from a ten month old to a senior in High School.

Animal Licensing Deadline: February 28

All dogs and cats must be licensed no later than February 28, 2017. License fees for 2017 have increased to: \$11 per spayed or neutered dog, \$14 per unsprayed/non-neutered dog, and \$10 per household for all cats.

Applications received or postmarked **after** February 28th will be returned and you will be charged a \$30 late fee per dog and a \$10 late fee per household for all cats. If you do not license your pets, April summonses will be issued by the Animal Control Officer which would include a \$75.00 fee to be paid to the Court.

Applications can be found on the Township website, www.delawaretpnj.org/forms.html, at the Police station during business hours (Monday through Friday, 8 a.m. to 3 p.m.), and at the Rabies Clinic to be held December 3rd from 10 a.m. to Noon at the Township Garage. You must apply for your animal licenses during licensing time, from January 1st through February 28th.

Energy Assistance Program

The LIHEAP assistance program is a federally funded energy bill assistance program.

Financial help in the form of a grant or credit on an account is provided to both struggling and lower income households who need assistance paying for their home energy bills.

The program's purpose is to assist lower income families and households with meeting their immediate home energy needs. Funds are available in all states on a first come, first served basis.

Customers can get help paying for both winter heating bills as well as summer cooling bills, so the LIHEAP program provides year round assistance.

Are you interested in history? Delaware Township history, Hunterdon County history, or more? Marilyn Cummings of the Delaware Township Historical Society has worked with people throughout the local area and beyond to create a mapping tool that makes history come alive on your computer. This impressive effort depicts all kinds of interesting historical elements around town and beyond our borders. Based on Google Earth, the following is a tiny part of what you can see:

Washington Slept Here: The places Washington stayed throughout the colonies during the eight years of the Revolutionary War... including winter encampments, the northern forts, the presidential mansions, etc.

Hunterdon County in the 18th century: Includes 18th century roads, ferries, maps, villages, townships, and 18th century and early 19th century taverns and inns.

The Revolutionary War in New Jersey: Includes Defense of the Delaware, British Power, Trenton and Princeton, Forage War, Philadelphia Campaign, British Retreat, Revolution as Civil War, Post-Yorktown, and Winter Camps.

Townships: Alexandria, Bethlehem, Clinton, Delaware, East Amwell, Franklin, Holland, Kingwood, Lebanon, Raritan, Readington, Tewksbury, Union, and West Amwell.

Boroughs and Villages: Annandale, Bloomsbury, Califon, Clinton, Flemington, Frenchtown, Glen Gardner, Hampton, High Bridge, Lambertville, Lebanon, Milford, New Hampton, Ringoes, and Stockton.

PennEast Pipeline Update

As last reported, the Draft Environmental Impact Statement (DEIS) was released during the summer and there was a September 12th deadline for comments. The Township's Pipeline Subcommittee compiled and submitted extensive comments before the deadline as did several other local groups.

In addition, Delaware Township participated with Hopewell and Kingwood Townships to hire Banish Associates to write additional comments for our Townships. We were advised that if we intended to employ professionals to assist us, this was the right time because the DEIS is one of the most crucial steps of the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission (FERC) process.

The Township also learned, from our residents, that PennEast was sending appraisers out to appraise the properties that they intend to "take" for their pipeline. The Township responded by passing an ordinance disallowing appraisers on Township property and discouraging the use of Township rights of way to access private property.

Most recently, FERC sent notice that the final Environmental Impact Statement, originally scheduled to be released in February, 2017 has been delayed until May 2017. We understand that the delay is due to the fact that the comment period was extended because the pipeline route was again modified and people potentially affected by the new route had to be given the opportunity to comment.
